Bender Biography

I was raised on the somewhat shabby side of the rural middle class. The women in my family were fundamentalist Christians and the men in my family worked for a living and often enjoyed their beer and liquor. Work and achievement were expected of everyone. Idleness was one of the worst characteristics a person could exhibit. Many in my family were heavy drinkers and others suffered from depression and anxiety. I don't mean to denigrate my family or my upbringing—I dearly love my family members and they could largely be classified as "good folks." But the fact is that I am a product of my cultural, social, and psychological upbringing—both positive and negative aspects.

My upbringing instilled within me a deep-seated fear of God. I lived my life afraid of "messing up." I was afraid of God, afraid of death, afraid of getting in trouble, afraid of Judgment Day, and afraid of going to Hell. In retrospect, I would describe my religious upbringing as being fear-based. Even as I grew, and my theological knowledge expanded past my primitive religious doctrines, I still had a religious fear deep within me. On the other hand, the drinkers in my family instilled in me the benefits of drinking. Drinking was a regular activity—after work, on holidays, while working in the shop or yard after work, while speaking with a friend or neighbor—essentially any time it was allowed. Men bonded around beer—it was usually fun. My father tended to drink every day of the week—moderately during the week and heavy on weekends. As a youngster I committed myself to never being a drinker.

I discovered beer drinking my sophomore year of high school. Like many high schoolers, I drank with friends. Because of my religious guilt experienced after drinking, I learned to drink the first few drinks very fast so the alcohol would blot out my guilt. During my junior and senior years of high school, drinking with friends became a regular activity. I usually got plastered and rarely drank in moderation. I was raised mostly around boys and men. So, I was afraid of women. I found that to talk to girls, beer would remove the fear. Drinking rarely worked for getting a date because I drank large amounts so quickly that I would regularly get rowdy and/or make an ass of myself.

I worked my way through college, so I didn't have much time for college parties. I drank some with my co-workers on construction sites but it wasn't a daily activity. Around breaks and holidays, I partied with friends, but my work and my school were priority When I had the opportunity to drink, I drank to excess. The concept of just having a beer or two was foreign to me. I enjoyed getting drunk, acting silly with friends, and escaping from life's stresses for a while. On Spring Break of my senior year, I had an experience (that I will not describe in this space). The incident filled me with fear and plunged me into an emotional place that I had never experienced. It was depression—though I did not know what it was at the time. I decided to drink till my fear disappeared. My depression lasted about four months and through it I drank heavily.

Entering the world of work, I entered the world of daily drinking. As a bachelor, daily after work drinking and weekend partying was my regular activity. I usually went to bars with men several decades older than myself who were active in their personal alcoholism. I fit in well. I was still young and had some self-control. I enjoyed my drinking and learned to kill hangovers with a few morning beers. By the time I ate my lunch, the hangover subsided and I

was ready to hit the bar again. After several years, my lifestyle was beginning to catch up with me. I was in poor physical shape and I was becoming regularly restless, irritable, and discontent with every aspect of my life. After an evening of hard drinking, I drank myself into the vomiting bed spins. I was to the end of my rope with my emotions, too. One night, in pain and in my drunken state, I cried to God, "Please help me!" I met my wife shortly thereafter.

Meeting my wife filled me with purpose and positive energy. I started dating her and spent very little time drinking. We got engaged six months after our first date and were married in another six months. I rarely drank, and never in the house. When I did get the opportunity to get drunk, I drank to excess. We began our family and within a few years we had three daughters below the age of three. I had two jobs and was a dedicated family man. Keeping our finances above water was my priority. I rarely had time off.

As our girls got older and my wife returned to work, I was able to have free weekends. It was weird because I did not know how to enjoy free time and had difficulty enjoying my time when I was not working. My fishing and hunting hobbies and most other activities quickly became drinking events. My weekends became drinking time. Soon I was stopping for after work beers. Around the age of 40, I was at work and began experiencing chest pains. I went to the doctor and was diagnosed with anxiety. The doctor prescribed clonazepam and so began my addiction to benzodiazepines. My health insurance included the discount pharmacy by mail, so I would receive hundreds of clonazepam pills every three months. Over time, my beer drinking and anxiety medication became a combination that slowly moved me past a point of no return.

My addiction was a slow cooker. Over several years, I continued to drink excessively and pop clonazepam tablets. I'd use the benzos to slowly taper off my ever more frequent binges. When I reached rock bottom, I was a physical, emotional, and cognitive mess. I wanted nothing more than for my wife to kick me out so I could go somewhere unknown and drink endlessly and the thought of death was welcomed. I supplemented my drinking with straight vodka and soon lost all control. The poisonous hangovers and the emotional pain became too much. I confessed to my wife, "I need professional help." I went into the intensive outpatient program at Bayview Hospital.

One of the requirements of IOP was mandatory attendance at Alcoholics Anonymous meet. I knew nothing of AA and didn't know what to expect. I began attending an early morning meeting at New Phoenix Group. Surprisingly, I immediately felt a connection to the others in the meeting. I discovered that my vague, preconceived notions were inaccurate. My pain had rendered me willing to listen to my new friends. I quickly trusted the AA members of that morning meeting and was willing to give their program a try. My personal experience had shown without a doubt that I was indeed powerless over alcohol. I got a sponsor, began to pray on my knees, and surrendered to the program as best as I could.

Recovery has been an amazing process. God has shown his grace and AA has given me tools for successful living. As long as I am willing to attend meetings and do what I have been taught to do by others who are working a successful program of recovery, my life continues to improve. Some days are more difficult than others, but I have learned to trust God and just "do today." My Heavenly Father has revealed Himself to me in amazing ways. My fear of God, death, and judgment have been removed. I am learning to trust God as I journey through life. I still experience life's struggles, but my fears have been largely replaced with a deep sense of happiness and contentment.




CBIA Appreciates Ongoing Support


Memorial Contributions

- 4. Provides an A.A. listing in the Telephone directory.
- 5. Provides a 24-hour volunteer phone answering during hours when the office is closed.
- 6. Publishes meeting schedules of all groups in the Coastal Bend Area at no charge.
- 7. Publishes a monthly newsletter, the "Coastal Bender", to keep A.A. members informed of local A.A. affairs and special events.
- 8. Purchases and sells "CONFERENCE APPROVED' literature, and non-conference approved Anniversary Medallions, Sobriety Chips.
- 9. Conducts monthly Trustee meetings. All members of Alcoholics Anonymous are welcome at these meetings and Group Input is essential.
- 10. Conducts Quarterly Meetings to keep groups apprised of Intergroup activities, and to seek group participation in CBIA affairs.
- 11. Maintains service committees for service work in the Coastal Bend Area.

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
