AA Member's Story

My mom did the best she knew how for someone who birthed her first child at 14 years old, marrying the jock who was so angry he impregnated the 14-year-old, eliminating his ability to accept the several scholarships he received to go on to play college sports. Now it was time for my parents at ages 14 and 17 to marry and raise what ultimately would be 3 children by the time my mom was 18. Neither of my parents were alcoholics, but my dad had the "ism's" we speak of. I would later learn so much about the abuse and violence my dad grew up around as a very young child, at the hands of his mother's turnstile of men. My dad was not able to stop the pattern of abuse and carried that into our family in various ways against my mom, my brother, and myself; my younger sister was fortunate to be somewhat unscathed.

After my parents finally divorced, the partying began subtlety for me. I took the opportunity to get a little of my mom's wine from the very large jug she often had in the refrigerator. She was not an alcoholic...I mean, she made spritzers with sprite and barely a splash of wine. I tried to be an adult and be like mom, but I found the spritzers a tad weak for my taste and often added more wine when she wasn't looking. I would convince her to let me have a little, but I always went back for "more" than a splash. She'd sometimes ask why her bottle was going lower, quicker than she was drinking it, and of course, I lied! She was very naïve and somehow, I already knew how to manipulate her into getting what I wanted, especially after my dad was now out of the picture.

Fast forward and my drinking amped up in my teenage years into adulthood. I didn't think I had a problem, because I had friends who binged and drank like me, and we called that "partying". It didn't take long to see that at some events, I was the one drinking too much, acting the fool, falling while dancing, and I always seemed to be the only one too hungover to get out of bed the following day. I made poor choices about men, friendships, and extracurricular partying when under the influence of alcohol. I had said many times I would guit drinking, and over the years would have some luck with that, but I always started back after short sabbaticals.

I never attempted AA before because honestly, I was not ready to completely give up alcohol. I had that fear that life would no longer be fun and how would I attend events without being able to consume alcohol! How could I ever go to the beach in Port Aransas and not drink. Who goes to the beach and doesn't drink, I thought. The year prior to my 56th birthday, I told my husband several times I may need to go to AA if I cannot quit without starting back up again. Of course, I'd say that only on the day I was completely hungover, puking my guts out, not being able to hold down ice chips until late afternoon. However, a week later, there I was, romancing my wine, one more time.

Finally, one day, by no court order, judge, employer, or spouse's insistence, I had enough and found a meeting that I attended. I believed you were going to show me how to quit drinking and that was going to be a great thing. I also believed my life was now going to be just wonderful all the time and so many great things were going to magically happen for me. There would still be life events where I would no longer choose alcohol for my soothing, and I had to learn how to deal with that. I soon learned I needed to pick-up the tools of the program to learn how to deal with life on God's terms, and not mine. Working the 12 steps with my sponsor opened my eyes to my past and who I really am and who I'm not. I'm a child of God and no matter my past, my higher power loves me, no matter what my past looks like, or even when I make mistakes today, and this gift is each of ours, if we want it. I'm so grateful for those who showed up to meetings when I was a newcomer, and I choose to suit up and show up so that I too can be the hand of AA when a newcomer walks through the doors of the fellowship. Praying on my knees every morning starts my day on the right foot and even when I get off track, you taught me that a bad moment doesn't make a bad day, and I can get right back on track.

If I had not walked into these rooms 6 years ago, and followed your suggestions, staying sober one day at a time, sometimes one moment at a time, I would not have these wonderful life tools and be walking the road to happy destiny with you all! I'm forever grateful to the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous for my sobriety. Thank you for allowing me to share a bit of my story with you.




CBIA Appreciates Ongoing Support

You might want to consider giving more to Intergroup and GSO and less to other service entities. Also, if your group has money earmarked that can be sent in earlier, that would be helpful.
